Policy Position: Commercial Marijuanaⁱ

The Needham Board of Health believes that the legalization of marijuana for widespread commercial use is incompatible with the Board's mandate from the Massachusetts General Court to protect the public health and wellness of the Town of Needham and all its residents.^{ii,iii}

Marijuana use, particularly long-term, chronic use that begins at a young age, can lead to dependence and addiction.^{iv} Marijuana is the second leading substance for which people receive drug treatment^v and also a major cause for visits to hospital emergency departments.^{vi} And marijuana potency has continually increased over the past few decades,^{vii} raising serious concerns about implications for public health – especially among adolescents, for whom long-term use of marijuana may be linked with lower IQ (as much as an average 8 point drop) later in life.^{viii}

Scientific research shows us that increasing the availability of drugs can lead to increased use, and ever greater consequences resulting from that use:

- Legalization increases the availability and acceptability of drugs, as we see with alcohol and tobacco – which far outpaces the use of illegal drugs.^{ix}
- Increased availability and acceptability of marijuana would likely lead to increased consumption of the drug.^x Since legalization in Colorado teen use has jumped 20% and it is has the dubious distinction of being the state highest rate of teen marijuana use.^{xi}

Data from the MetroWest Adolescent Health Survey demonstrates that a significant number of youth in Needham and across the state already use marijuana, which makes the proposition of increased availability of the drug through legalization a serious concern for the local community.

- In 2014, 32% of Needham High School students reported they had used marijuana in their lifetime and 22% reported use in the past 30 days.^{xii} In Massachusetts, high school students indicated that 41% had used marijuana in their lifetime and 25% reported use in the past 30 days.^{xiii}

- Youth in Needham and in Massachusetts indicate a low perception of risk associated with marijuana use. Less than half (38%) of Massachusetts high school students reported that they believe smoking marijuana occasionally would be a moderate or great risk to their health and in Needham only 54% of high school students surveyed reported that there is a moderate or great risk of people harming themselves if they smoke marijuana one or twice a week. ^{xiv}

The Needham Board of Health joins with a long list of organizations including the American Medical Association, the American Academy of Pediatrics, the Massachusetts Medical Association, the Massachusetts Hospital Association, and the Massachusetts Public Health Association, all of which have concluded that the legalization of commercial marijuana is incompatible with public health and community well-being.


This Policy Position formally adopted following a unanimous vote during a noticed public meeting, October 21, 2016.
